

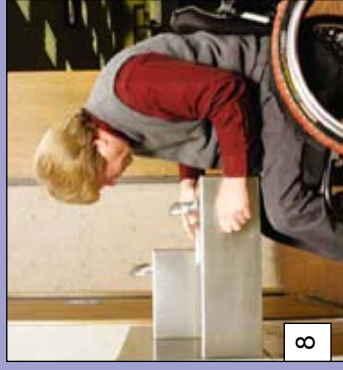

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Features Promoting Barrier-Free Voting

1. Staff who are trained in disability etiquette are more effective in assisting all voters.
2. Accessible voting machines enable people who are blind or visually impaired to vote in a confidential manner.
3. Service animals are welcome in polling places and enable persons with disabilities to function independently.
4. Wide entrances without steps permit easy access by people who use wheelchairs or walkers as well as parents with strollers.
5. A wide and unobstructed path with a smooth, firm, and slip-resistant surface is a safer, more accessible environment.
6. Large print signs allow people with low vision and older voters to easily read information.
7. Signs with raised letters, Braille, and universal symbols help all people find their way.
8. Water fountains at the correct height make it easier for everyone to get a drink.
9. Signage directs people to the accessible entrances.
